Her most popular TED-Talks include *The Danger of a Single Story (2009) and We Should All Be Feminists (2012)*. She has received various awards, including a MacArthur Fellowship in 2008, a National Humanities Medal in 2010 etc. In this paper delves one of her Purple Hibiscus with Pillar's theory which developed by Baumrind.

Diana Blumberg Baumrind was a clinical and developmental psychologist, best known for her work on parenting styles and her criticism of the use of deception in psychological research. He developed three parenting styles including authoritative, authoritarian, and permissive/indulgent. Later, Maccoby and Martin introduced the uninvolved/neglectful method. This theory investigates, how parenting approaches influence children's development.

In the novel *Purple Hibiscus*, Chimamanda Ngozi Adichie states the two types of parenting include authoritative and authoritatian. Authoritative parent style is used in the character Aunty Ifemelu and authoritatian parent styles have the character Eugene Achike (Papa). By these styles of parenting, how the children affect by the behaviour of Eugene and how the children have an opportunity by the parenting styles from the character Aunty Ifeoma. Aunty Ifeoma, as evidenced by Baumrind's authoritative parenting style, is an important figure in the novel Purple Hibiscus. She is a very bold, strong-willed woman, who works as a lecturer at Nigeria's University. She is Eugene Achike's sister, as well as the mother of Amaka, Obiora, and Chima. Her parenting method has given her children excellent interpersonal skills, questioning capacities, tenacity, the ability to think by their own, the opportunity to learn from their mistakes, believe, self-confidence, self-esteem, finding their passion and sense of self. "Authoritative parents are adept at striking a balance between responsiveness and demandingness" (Watabe, Akiko, 2014) This type of parenting balance their demanding and responsibilities.

#### **COMPARATIVE ANALYSIS**

According to this Assertion from Baumrind's Pillar Theory, Eugene Achike (Papa) performs a toxic function in the novel. His authoritarian parenting style has an emotional and physical impact on his children, 15-year-old Kambili Achike and her 17-year-old brother, Jaja. His unrealistic expectations of perfection have a negative impact on the children. As a result, the youngsters have low self-confidence, self-thinking, peer doubtful abilities, a sense of self, and self-esteem. They are constantly in fear and isolated from their peer relationships. According to Baumrind's idea, some instances of the impact of authoritarian parenting style include Harry Potter's stern aunt and uncle and Cinderella's nasty stepmother. As parents, we should provide

warm support to our children, and all children depend upon the care of their parents. A Parent is the most wonderful and helpful person in the world. If the parent fails to play an appropriate role, the child's life will undoubtedly suffer. Mistrust is something that people create for themselves. All teenagers have a difficult life, due to a lack of parental support and a lack of self-esteem. Parents should provide unconditional support to their children. Eugene Achike focuses heavily on Kambili Achike and Jaja in his work *Purple Hibiscus*. He insists his Catholic values in his family. He assigned a specific time for each task in his family. The children are unable to experience any sense of relaxation. "We always soaked tiny sections of fabric in the foamy water first to check if the colors would run, although we knew they would not. We wanted to spend every minute of the half hour Papa allocated to uniform washing" (Adichie 13). Through this statement, we can learn about the two children's awful situation. Their father set aside half an hour for their dress washing. If they are failing to comply, will the result in severe consequences. They have experienced a lot of violence and a painful event in their lives. Children are unable to acquire competent skills if their parents provide little support and place a great value on obedience. This is a significant issue in our culture. Parents believe that severe or dominating rules will instill obedience in their children, however, this approach may not always work for everyone. Today's generation expects their parents to play a close role, similar to that of a friend.

"I was in my room after lunch, reading James chapter five because I would talk about the biblical roots of the anointing of the sick during family time, when I heard the sounds. Swift, heavy thuds on my parents' hand-carved bedroom door. I imagined the door had gotten stuck and Papa was trying to open it. If I imagined it hard enough, then it would be true. I sat down, closed my eyes, and started to count. Counting made it seem not that long, made it seem not that bad. Sometimes it was over before I even got to twenty. I was at nineteen when the sounds stopped. I heard the door open. Papa's gait on the stairs sounded heavier, more awkward, than usual" (Adichie 19).

## The Role of Violence in Family Dynamics

Chimamanda Ngozi Adichie's writing discusses how violence plays a corrosive role in the formation of a teenager's life. The two youngsters experience such violence between their parents. This incident attempts to make them feel alone, and it may cause them to ponder violence in a profound manner, sometimes prompting them to play their own lives. This is not just about the two youngsters, Kambili and Jaja, but also represents all teenagers around the world. Teenagers' ages range from 12 to 18, which is an important stage in their development. At this point, people have begun to evaluate and research themselves in quest of an identity and passion. At this stage, if parents did not play a significant part, they are becoming confused in their personal career. "Was Mama sure the baby was gone? I was still staring at her belly when Sisi came in" (Adichie 20). Here, the children are eagerly expecting their upcoming sister or brother. They had a fascinating discussion regarding their future baby brother. However, as a result of the papa's conduct violations, their mother Beatrice endures reiterated abortions. So, they think about it and devise a way to save this child from his father's nasty behaviour.

# The Search for Identity and Security

Commonly children are affected by several issues from their family. These conflicts impact the mind and the body. If a youngster overcomes several difficulties during their adolescence, it may cause post-traumatic stress disorder because their mind and thoughts are filled with the quarrel environment. It affects their growth and potential severally. This is an authoritarian parenting style, and these are the consequences for children, who are subjected to it. Baumrind also addresses authoritarian parenting approaches. It is to give an ideal environment with boundaries and appropriate demands for their children.

"Authoritative parenting is high on warmth,
moderate on discipline, high in communication
and moderate in expectations of maturity. This style
is becoming more pervasive in the West. Authoritative parents are warm and nurturing, create a
loving home environment and provide a high degree of
emotional support (Ingersoll, 1989)."

According to Baumrind's Pillar Theory, *Aunty Ifeoma* plays an essential role in the story, she contributes significantly to their children's development. Adichie's portrayal of this character exhibits exceptional parenting skills. She also looks into the features of women in various activities. Aunty Ifeoma's parenting style is nurturing and loving for her children. As a result, her children are capable of learning well, studying well, communicating effectively, performing self-analysis, possessing self-confidence and a sense of self, discovering their passion and learning from their mistakes. These are the factors that lead to children's independence. Aunty Ifeoma understands how to manage a child's life and development. She is constantly taking the initiative and contributing significantly to their children's development. She isn't like Papa's destructive parenting.

"The words in my textbooks kept turning into blood each time I read them. Even as my first term exams approached, even when we started to do class reviews, the words still made no sense" (Adichie 22).

Chimamanda Ngozi Adichie's writing tackles the hardships of children who have overbearing parents. Every youngster requires soothing affection from their parents or caregivers. If we are not prepared to provide appropriate advice to them, their lives may become tragic during their developmental process.
