Natural attractions like Chitrakote Falls further enhance the state’s appeal by attracting nature enthusiasts and adventure tourists. Simultaneously, cultural tourism in Chhattisgarh reflects the vibrant traditions of its tribal communities, whose lifestyles, festivals, handicrafts, music, and dance forms represent a living cultural heritage. Historic centers such as Sirpur and the ancient Boramdeo Temple showcase the architectural and spiritual legacy of the region. The promotion of traditional crafts, including bell metal and terracotta art, strengthens both cultural preservation and rural livelihoods. The combined growth of eco-tourism and cultural tourism supports environmental conservation, socio-economic development, and the empowerment of local communities. Through responsible tourism practices and sustainable planning, Chhattisgarh holds strong potential to emerge as a model state for balanced and inclusive tourism development in India

The state also preserves a strong cultural identity through its tribal traditions, folk dances, festivals, and handicrafts. Historical sites like Boramdeo Temple showcase the architectural beauty and religious significance of ancient times. Together, eco-tourism and cultural tourism help conserve biodiversity, protect

cultural heritage, and create livelihood opportunities, contributing to the sustainable development of Chhattisgarh.

The research further aims to explore the cultural tourism resources of Chhattisgarh, including historical temples such as Boramdeo Temple, the ancient heritage site of Sirpur Archaeological Site, and vibrant tribal festivals like Bastar Dussehra, which reflect the unique traditions and customs of the region.

Additionally, the study intends to analyze the economic and social impact of eco-tourism and cultural tourism on local communities, particularly tribal populations, by examining employment generation, income opportunities, and community participation. It also aims to identify the major challenges in tourism development, such as environmental degradation, inadequate infrastructure, and cultural commercialization, and to suggest sustainable measures and policy recommendations for balanced growth while preserving the natural and cultural heritage of Chhattisgarh.

Eco-Tourism places of Chhattisgarh :

1. Bastar division in Chhattisgarh offers rich eco-tourism, featuring the "Niagara of India" Chitrakote Falls, dense forests, and ancient caves. Key spots include Kanger Valley National Park, Tirathgarh Falls, Bailadila mountains, keshkal valley, Bamboo rafting, the Dholkal Ganesh Pratima, Dalpat Sagar jheel, Tamad ghumar Waterfall, Maa Danteshwari Temple, Bhairamgarh Wildlife Sanctuary, Abujhmad Hills – An unexplored region, Handawada Waterfall, Malanj kudum Waterfall, Charre-Marre Waterfall, Gadiya Mountain and tribal cultural sites. It is a premier destination for nature lovers, trekking, and wildlife photography.

2. Surguja division in Chhattisgarh is a prime eco-tourism hub, featuring the scenic hill station of Mainpat ("Tibet of Chhattisgarh") with waterfalls like Tiger Point, Mehta point and Fish Point & Jaljali (bouncy land), Jogimara & Sita Bengra Caves – Ancient rock-cut caves, Tatat Pani Hot Water Spring, Tamor Pingla and Semarsot Wildlife Sanctuaries, Sanjay National Park (Ghasi Das National park), Rakasganda Fall, Pavai Waterfall, Amritdhara Waterfall, Ramdhara Waterfall, Hasdeo River scenic spots, Rajpuri Waterfall, Dangari & Rani Dah Waterfalls, Jashpur Plateau (hills & greenery), Church and tribal culture sites.

It offers rich biodiversity, tribal culture, caves, and trekking spots.

3. Bilaspur division of Chhattisgarh centers around rich biodiversity, featuring the renowned Achanakmar Wildlife Sanctuary, dense Sal forests, waterfalls like Chandni Falls, and scenic spots such as Kutaghat Dam and Madku Dweep, Ram Jharna Waterfall, Gomarda Wildlife Sanctuary, Raigarh Fort, Chaiturgarh Fort –

Hilltop fort, Dev Pahari Temple, Hasdeo River, Ancient Vishnu Temple (Janjgir), Shivrinarayan Temple, Key attractions include eco-resorts like Kunder Hill and the Kanan Pendari Zoo.

3. Durg division of Chhattisgarh offers rich eco-tourism, featuring the Bharamdev temple, Devbaloda shiv temple, Siya devi, Dongargarh, Pragyagiri Hill – Buddha statue & peace site, Sarodha Dam/Reservoir. Man made zoo like Matri garden, Shahid park, Tagada dam, he was Tandula dam and resorts and many more

4. Raipur division of Chhattisgarh features dense forests, waterfalls, and wildlife sanctuaries, with top destinations including Barnawapara Wildlife Sanctuary, Jatmai-Ghatrani waterfalls, and Nandan Van Zoo, Sirpur, Karopani Black Buck conservation Area, Gadiya mountain.

Cultural - Tourism places of Chhattisgarh :

Chhattisgarh offers rich cultural tourism, blending ancient tribal traditions with historical, architectural, and spiritual sites. Key attractions include the 11th-century Bharamdeo Temple ("Khajuraho of Chhattisgarh"), the ancient city of Sirpur, the historic Bastar region (Danteswari Temple), and unique festivals like Bastar Dussehra and the Rajim Kumbh Mela, Laxman Temple and rich Buddhist, Hindu, and Jain archaeological ruins. Deorani-Jethani temples (Talagaon, Bilaspur) and the mysterious Rudra Shiva idol.

Barsoor (Dantewada) known as the city of temples and tanks, featuring the Mama Bhanja Temple and huge Ganesh idols.

Tribal Culture & Festivals:

Bastar Dussehra: A unique, 75-day festival celebrated with great fervor by local tribes.

Madai Festival: A traveling festival celebrated by the tribes in Kanker and Bastar.

Art and Dance: Tribal art, including Dhokra (bell metal) casting, is prevalent in Bastar, while traditional dances like Panthi and Raut Nacha are integral to the culture.

Ramgarh and Sita Bengra (Surguja) known for prehistoric cave paintings and believed to be the site of Kalidasa's Meghdootam.

Raigarh known as the cultural capital, famous for the Raigarh Gharana of Kathak.

Current Scenario of Eco-Tourism in Chhattisgarh

Eco-tourism in Chhattisgarh has been gradually evolving into a significant segment of the state's tourism landscape, driven by increasing environmental awareness, government support, and community participation. With nearly half of the state under forest cover, Chhattisgarh naturally lends itself to nature-based travel experiences that emphasize conservation, cultural integration, and sustainable development. In recent years, both domestic and international attention has turned toward Chhattisgarh's eco-tourism potential, particularly in areas where biodiversity, tribal culture, and natural landscapes converge.

One of the most notable developments in the current scenario is the **international recognition of Dhudmaras village in Bastar district under the United Nations World Tourism Organization (UNWTO) Best Tourism Villages programme**. Dhudmaras showcases a model of community-led eco-tourism, where local tribal youth act as guides and hosts, offering kayaking, bamboo rafting, guided nature walks, and traditional homestay experiences. The participation of the community in tourism activities has helped preserve tribal customs and lifestyles while generating income and employment within the village. This recognition by UNWTO has placed Chhattisgarh on the global eco-tourism map and demonstrated the potential of sustainable rural tourism models in India.

At the heart of Chhattisgarh's eco-tourism offerings are its rich protected areas and wildlife habitats. **Kanger Valley National Park in Bastar** remains one of the most visited eco-tourism destinations, attracting visitors with its dense forests, limestone caves (such as Kutumsar and Dandak), waterfalls, and abundant wildlife. The park supports guided trekking, bird watching, nature study tours, and cultural interactions with nearby villages. Similarly, **Indravati National Park**, one of the largest wildlife reserves in central India, is vital

for eco-tourism focused on wildlife conservation, including sightings of endangered species such as the wild water buffalo. Although some areas face infrastructural challenges and limited accessibility, conservation-oriented tourism initiatives are promoting responsible visitation.

Wildlife sanctuaries such as **Barnawapara Wildlife Sanctuary and Sitanadi Wildlife Sanctuary** contribute to the eco-tourism scene by offering safari experiences, bird watching opportunities, and forest explorations. Barnawapara's proximity to urban centres such as Raipur has made it a preferred destination for weekend nature tourism, helping generate awareness among visitors about wildlife protection and forest ecosystems. These protected areas are increasingly developing eco-friendly accommodations, nature trails, and educational experiences designed to enhance appreciation for biodiversity while maintaining ecological integrity.

Waterfalls and forest landscapes across Bastar, including the renowned **Chitrakote Waterfalls**, further enrich the state's eco-tourism profile. **Often called the "Niagara of India,"** Chitrakote draws a large number of tourists, especially during the monsoon season, for its dramatic water flows and scenic beauty. These natural attractions form an important link between eco-tourism and adventure tourism, offering opportunities for boating (in permitted seasons), nature photography, and interaction with local communities. The spread of small eco-resorts and village-based stays around such sites reflects a move toward integrating local participation with nature-centric tourism.

Government policies and initiatives have also played a role in shaping the current scenario of eco-tourism. The state's tourism department has introduced regulations and support systems such as **homestay policies and training programmes** that empower local residents to benefit economically from tourism while ensuring quality and safety for visitors. Infrastructure improvements, better road connectivity, and marketing campaigns are gradually enhancing access to key eco-tourism sites. Additionally, efforts to link eco-tourism with wildlife conservation — for example, through the expansion of tiger reserves — aim to strengthen both ecological protection and visitor experiences.

Despite these positive developments, challenges remain. Awareness of many eco-tourism destinations outside of major hubs is limited, leading to uneven visitor distribution. Some regions still require improved infrastructure, better signage, and enhanced promotional strategies to attract wider audiences. Environmental concerns have also been raised regarding fragile natural sites, where unregulated tourism—if not carefully managed—could threaten biodiversity and disturb local ecosystems. Ensuring that tourism growth does not come at the cost of ecological degradation remains a central concern for planners and stakeholders.

Overall, the current scenario of eco-tourism in Chhattisgarh reflects a transition toward sustainable, community-driven, and conservation-oriented tourism development. The state's natural landscapes, protected areas, and tribal cultural experiences provide a strong foundation for eco-tourism, and with continued emphasis on responsible practices, infrastructure development, and international cooperation, Chhattisgarh is poised to emerge as a model for balanced eco-tourism in India.

Homestay Policy of Chhattisgarh

In June 2025, the Cabinet of the Government of Chhattisgarh officially approved and notified the "Chhattisgarh Homestay Policy 2025-30" as part of its effort to boost rural tourism and local livelihoods. The policy was cleared in a cabinet meeting chaired by Chief Minister

Vishnu Deo Sai, with the objective of expanding tourism in **remote and tribal regions** such as **Bastar and Surguja divisions**, which are rich in culture, forests, waterfalls, and tribal heritage.

The official notification from the state cabinet highlights that this policy is designed to:

- **Promote tourism in village and tribal areas** by allowing local families to operate registered homestays.
- **Offer rural and tribal cultural experiences to tourists**, including local art, craft, cuisine, customs, and lifestyle.
- **Increase income and employment opportunities** for local residents, especially youth and women.
- **Support the national goal of "Vocal for Local"** by integrating local culture and products into tourism offerings

This policy, formally notified as the **Chhattisgarh Homestay Policy 2025-30**, acts as a government scheme rather than a standalone law. It provides a policy framework under which the Department of Tourism will implement homestay registration, training, incentives, and support systems to make it easier for villagers to participate in tourism activities.

The notification received widespread coverage in news reports when the policy was approved, **specifying that homestay units can be run by rural households** and that giving tourists an authentic local experience will not only strengthen tourism but also contribute to socio-economic development in previously under-represented regions.

Current Scenario of Cultural Tourism in Chhattisgarh

Cultural tourism in Chhattisgarh has been gaining increased attention in recent years as the state works to showcase its rich and diverse heritage, including tribal traditions, ancient monuments, festivals, and performing arts. Cultural tourism refers to travel that is motivated by interest in the heritage, art, lifestyle and cultural expressions of a place, and in Chhattisgarh this includes a blend of tribal, Hindu, Buddhist, and folk traditions that have evolved over centuries. One of the major strengths of cultural tourism in Chhattisgarh is the **vibrant festival culture** that draws visitors throughout the year. Annual celebrations such as **Bastar Dussehra and Madai Festival** showcase tribal rites, folk music, and indigenous dance forms, attracting tourists and scholars interested in indigenous traditions. Another key event is **Chhattisgarh Rajyotsava, the state's foundation day celebration**, which brings together folk performers, craft exhibitions, food fairs, and cultural showcases that reflect the state's linguistic and artistic diversity. Cultural festivals and exhibitions are increasingly recognized as platforms for preserving intangible heritage while promoting community participation. For example, extra government support has been directed toward youth cultural initiatives such as the **State Youth Festival**, which brings together thousands of young performers from across Chhattisgarh to celebrate traditional dance, song and artistry, further linking cultural pride with tourism.

Historic and archaeological sites are also being emphasized to strengthen cultural tourism. The ancient township of **Sirpur Archaeological Site** has long been a cultural and spiritual centre **due to its Buddhist heritage and historical monuments**, and plans are underway to boost its global profile through improved visitor infrastructure and **World Heritage aspirations**. This includes development of thematic visitor trails, inclusive facilities, and digital interpretation tools to attract both researchers and global tourists. Similarly, heritage conservation projects around sites like **Bhoramdeo Temple — often called the “Khajuraho of Chhattisgarh”** for its exquisite medieval carvings — are being enhanced under national tourism schemes to improve access and experience for cultural tourists.

Beyond festivals and monuments, Chhattisgarh is also investing in **new cultural infrastructure** to diversify its tourism offerings. A major initiative approved by the Central Government involves the development of **a film city and tribal cultural centre in Raipur** aimed at promoting film tourism and providing a dedicated space to celebrate tribal customs, arts, and cultural events at scale. This project is expected to expand the **global appeal of Chhattisgarh's cultural heritage** while supporting local artists and communities.

The state has also modernized museum experiences to present tribal history and contributions, as seen with the inauguration of **India's first digital tribal museum in Raipur**, which highlights the heroic legacy of **tribal freedom fighters** and provides interactive cultural interpretation for visitors.

Efforts are underway at the grassroots level as well, with initiatives to **document, protect and revive sacred grove sites (Devgudi)** that play an important role in tribal spiritual life and ecological traditions. By integrating these sacred groves into broader cultural tourism circuits, local communities are able to share their living heritage with visitors while reinforcing stewardship of both culture and nature.

Despite these positive trends, challenges remain. Cultural tourism development requires sustained investment in infrastructure, effective marketing to reach national and international audiences, and sensitive management to ensure traditions are preserved rather than commercialized. Continued collaboration between government agencies, research institutions like **Indian Institute of Technology Bhilai**, and local

stakeholders is strengthening cultural tourism planning, documentation, and promotion in line with sustainable development goals.

Overall, the current scenario of cultural tourism in Chhattisgarh reflects a dynamic and diversifying sector, rooted in tribal and historical heritage but increasingly supported by modern infrastructure, policy initiatives, and community engagement. With targeted investment and inclusive planning, cultural tourism has the potential to become a major driver of economic growth and cultural preservation in the state.

SWOT Analysis of Eco-Tourism and Cultural Tourism in Chhattisgarh

1. Strengths

Chhattisgarh has several natural and cultural advantages that make it suitable for eco-tourism and cultural tourism development. 2. Weaknesses

Despite having significant tourism resources, Chhattisgarh faces several internal challenges that hinder tourism development. One major weakness is **limited infrastructure**, especially in remote eco-tourism destinations where roads, accommodation, and transportation facilities are insufficient. Many potential tourism sites remain underdeveloped due to lack of proper facilities. Another weakness is the **lack of effective marketing and global promotion**, which results in low awareness of the state's tourism attractions among national and international travelers. Additionally, there is a **shortage of trained tourism professionals**, including guides, hospitality staff, and tourism managers, which affects service quality. In some areas, inadequate tourism planning and limited investment further slow the growth of eco-tourism and cultural tourism.

3. Opportunities

Eco-tourism and cultural tourism in Chhattisgarh have strong opportunities for future development. Globally, there is increasing demand for **sustainable tourism, nature tourism, and authentic cultural experiences**, which aligns well with the state's tourism resources. Government initiatives such as tourism policies, homestay promotion, and eco-tourism projects can attract more visitors.

The development of **community-based tourism models** can generate employment and income for rural and tribal communities. Improved digital marketing, social media promotion, and participation in international tourism exhibitions can also enhance the global visibility of Chhattisgarh's tourism destinations. Additionally, sustainable tourism practices and heritage conservation programs can help preserve cultural traditions while promoting tourism.

4. Threats

Eco-tourism and cultural tourism in Chhattisgarh also face several external threats. Unregulated tourism development may cause **environmental degradation**, including deforestation, pollution, and disturbance to wildlife habitats. Climate change and natural disasters may also impact forests, rivers, and biodiversity. Another potential threat is the **commercialization of tribal culture**, which could weaken the authenticity of traditional rituals, festivals, and art forms. Competition from other Indian states with well-developed tourism infrastructure, such as Kerala, Rajasthan, and Himachal Pradesh, also poses a challenge. Furthermore, negative perceptions regarding safety in some remote areas may influence tourist decisions.

Analysis of Challenges

The primary quantitative challenge is the Seasonality Index. Tourism peaks sharply during the monsoon (waterfalls) and October (Dussehra), leading to under-utilized infrastructure for six months of the year.

Challenges

1. Limited Infrastructure and Connectivity

Many eco-tourism and cultural destinations in Chhattisgarh, such as remote forest areas or heritage sites, lack good road access, reliable electricity, clean water facilities, and digital connectivity.

Poor transport links make it difficult for tourists to reach places like dense forest regions, tribal homestay villages, waterfalls, and archaeological sites.

2. Insufficient Promotion and Marketing

Compared with other Indian states, Chhattisgarh’s tourism attractions are less known nationally and internationally.

Limited marketing budgets and outreach affect tourist inflow and awareness of unique tribal festivals, rural experiences, and heritage sites.

3. Seasonal and Festival-Centric Visitation

Tourism peaks mainly during specific festivals or seasons (e.g., monsoon for waterfalls or Bastar Dussehra for culture), resulting in uneven visitor numbers throughout the year.

Off-season tourism remains weak due to lack of year-round attractions or activities.

4. Environmental Sensitivity and Conservation Concerns

Eco-tourism sites like forests, caves, and waterfalls contain fragile ecosystems. Increasing tourist footfall without proper management can lead to soil erosion, littering, disturbance of wildlife, and habitat degradation.

5. Preservation vs. Commercialisation of Culture

Cultural tourism depends on authentic traditions and tribal way of life.

Unregulated commercialisation of rituals, festivals, art, music, and handicrafts can dilute cultural values and reduce community ownership.

6. Skill Gaps and Hospitality Standards

Local communities often lack adequate training in hospitality, language skills, and tourism management.

Inconsistent services may affect the quality of visitor experiences, especially at homestays and nature activity centres.

7. Security Perceptions

Some parts of Chhattisgarh have historically been affected by insurgent (Naxalite/Maoist) activity, creating perceptions about safety and security.

Although the situation has improved in many areas, these perceptions continue to influence tourist decisions.

8. Limited Data & Research Support

Effective planning requires accurate data on tourist behaviour, preferences, economic impact, and site capacity.

There is a lack of systematic research and data analytics that can guide policy and strategic development.

Eco-tourism and cultural tourism in Chhattisgarh have emerged as important components of the state's tourism development strategy in recent years. To fully utilize its tourism potential, the state must focus on improving connectivity, strengthening tourism infrastructure, enhancing skill development among local communities, and promoting responsible tourism practices.

Overall, eco-tourism and cultural tourism can play a significant role in the sustainable development of Chhattisgarh. By balancing economic growth with environmental conservation and cultural preservation, the state can establish itself as a unique and attractive tourism destination in India. With continued government support, community participation, and strategic planning, Chhattisgarh has the potential to become a leading hub for eco-tourism and cultural tourism in the future.

Recommendations and Solutions

Chhattisgarh needs stronger tourism promotion at national and international levels. Digital marketing, social media campaigns, tourism fairs, and partnerships with travel agencies can increase awareness about the state's tourism potential. Highlighting unique attractions like the heritage site of Sirpur Archaeological Site and cultural festivals such as Bastar Dussehra can attract more visitors.

3. Community Participation and Rural Tourism

Local communities should be actively involved in tourism development through homestays, handicraft markets, local guide services, and cultural performances. Successful eco-tourism villages like Dhudmaras demonstrate how community participation can generate employment, reduce migration, and preserve traditional lifestyles.

4. Skill Development and Training

Training programs should be organized for local residents in areas such as hospitality management, tourism guiding, language skills, and environmental conservation. Skilled human resources can improve service quality and enhance the overall tourist experience.

5. Environmental Conservation and Sustainable Tourism

Eco-tourism development must follow sustainable practices to protect forests, wildlife, and natural landscapes. Measures such as waste management systems, restrictions on visitor numbers, eco-friendly infrastructure, and environmental awareness campaigns are essential to maintain ecological balance.

6. Preservation of Tribal Culture and Heritage

Cultural tourism must focus on protecting the authenticity of tribal traditions, festivals, crafts, and rituals. Government agencies and cultural organizations should document and promote traditional art forms, music, dance, and handicrafts while preventing excessive commercialization.

7. Strengthening Safety and Tourist Facilities

Improving security arrangements, emergency services, and tourist information centers can increase traveler confidence. Clear communication about improved safety conditions will help attract more tourists to remote regions.

8. Policy Support and Investment

The government should encourage public-private partnerships (PPP) and provide financial incentives for eco-tourism projects, homestay development, and heritage conservation. Supportive policies and investment will accelerate tourism growth in the state.

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
