9. CASE STUDIES

9.1. RICE MILL CAFE & BAR, GOA:

AREA: 100 SQM

ARCHITECT: Raya Shank walker

Old architecture and restoration projects have always interested me. Throw in the Portuguese angle, and I am hooked (I am mid-way writing a book about old Mangalorean homes). So when I saw pictures of this old rice mill that an architectural firm in Goa converted into a cafe-bar with simple yet stunning old-world interiors, I had to feature it here. And I love that they decided to name it The Rice Mill.

Owned by the architect Raya Shank walker himself, and located at Morjin, the firm **Raya Shank walker Architects** designed the cafe to retrofit an existing structure that was originally constructed to function as a mill. The structure of the cafe-bar, with its exposed laterite walls, art deco grills, wooden trusses and Mangalore tiled roof was originally built in 1955.

The firm says their heritage conservation and adaptive reuse project aims to restore all the architectural elements that once lent the mill its nostalgic charm.

It accommodates a semi-open seating area in the verandah, an indoor seating area, a bar, washrooms, a kitchen and its herb garden. Structural additions such as the IPS floor and exposed brick walls are synonymous with the existing structure. Tropical plants breathe life into the space, while items of utility from the old rice mill become elements of decor in the cafe-bar.

Most items of furniture are sourced from local vendors, while certain pieces are constructed from recycled wood. Glass inserts in the existing Mangalore tiled roof allow rays of natural light to flood into the cafe.

The details right from the Mangalore tiles, to the windows with that trademark rising sun design, the colours and of course those 'folding chairs' Indeed a perfectly executed restoration. They add an air of authenticity to the space.

9.2. POSTCARD MANDALAY HALL, KERALA:

ARCHITECT: Stapati Architects

Mandalay Hall is one of few remaining Jewish homes on the Synagogue Lane, the historic Jew Town, adjacent to the Paradesi Synagogue built in the 1500's. Inspired by the history and beauty of the heritage structure, Mandalay Hall was conceived, bridging Kochi's past and present. The old structure was adaptively reused and converted into a boutique hotel. A conscious decision was taken to retain as much of the old structure, keeping the interventions to a bare minimum.

Mustard toned rustic walls lead one into a warmly lit reception area. The guiding walls are remnants of the past and are complemented by the luscious tropical courtyard that lies ahead. The luxury rooms or 'galleries' on the first-floor host custom installations by different artists and create a new layer of three-dimensional immersive experiences in the existing space.

At the center of the property is an open courtyard, which has been sensitively landscaped to create a green oasis.

The space also houses the Panchaloham, a high-end antique jewelry boutique, and an experimental restaurant serving contemporary Kerala cuisine.





9.3. KOTHI GULISTAN-E-IRAM, LUCKNOW:

CONSTRUCTED by: Commenced by Nawab Ghazi-ud-din Haider and finished during the reign of Nawab Nasir-ud-din Haider

Gulistan-e-Iram because a beautiful garden was maintained in front of this building with a small fountain in the center. The Gulistan or 'paradise' promised in the Holy Quran is a beautiful garden, with shade and water as its ideal elements and Iram as heaven or Jannat.

Gulistan-e-Iram was built in early 19th century by King Nasir-ud-Din Haider the second king of Awadh. it was the personal library of Nawab but after his death it became the farm house of British government.
