



Print Culture, Libraries and the Political Transformation of Hyderabad State (1900–1948)

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Abstract

The political transformation of Hyderabad State during the early twentieth century was shaped not only by administrative reforms and nationalist pressures but also by the emergence of print culture and intellectual institutions such as libraries and newspapers. Under the Asaf Jahi rulers, Hyderabad developed a complex socio-political structure characterized by feudal land relations, religious diversity, and gradual modernization in education, industry, and administration. While the Nizam's government introduced limited reforms in public finance, infrastructure, and education, large sections of rural society continued to experience economic exploitation and restricted political rights. In this environment, libraries, reading rooms, literary associations, and newspapers played a crucial role in disseminating knowledge and political ideas. They became important spaces where discussions about social reform, linguistic identity, and democratic governance were articulated. The development of the library movement in Telangana, particularly through organizations such as the Andhra Jana Sangham and the Andhra Mahasabha, facilitated the spread of literacy and public debate. Simultaneously, newspapers such as *Golconda Patrika*, *The Rayyat*, and *Andhra Patrika* served as platforms for political critique and nationalist expression. This paper examines the historical evolution of Hyderabad State from the late Asaf Jahi period to its integration into the Indian Union in 1948, emphasizing the role of libraries and print media in shaping political consciousness. The study argues that these institutions significantly contributed to mobilizing public opinion and facilitating the broader process of political transformation in Hyderabad.

Hyderabad State, one of the largest princely states in colonial India, occupied a significant place in the political and cultural history of the subcontinent. Ruled by the Asaf Jahi dynasty from the early eighteenth century until the mid-twentieth century, Hyderabad developed a unique administrative and socio-cultural system that combined elements of Mughal traditions, regional political practices, and modern bureaucratic reforms.

During the reign of the later Nizams, particularly Mir Osman Ali Khan (1911–1948), Hyderabad State witnessed notable developments in education, industry, and public administration. Institutions such as Osmania University, established in 1918, symbolized the Nizam's efforts to modernize the state's intellectual infrastructure. The government also introduced reforms in public finance, transportation, and irrigation projects. Despite these efforts, the social and economic structure of Hyderabad remained deeply influenced by feudal land relations dominated by jagirdars and deshmukhs.

The rural population, particularly peasants and agricultural laborers, experienced heavy taxation, forced labour practices, and limited access to education and political representation. These structural inequalities gradually generated dissatisfaction among various sections of society, including students, intellectuals, peasants, and emerging middle-class groups.

One of the most significant developments during the early twentieth century was the emergence of a vibrant intellectual and literary culture in Hyderabad State. Libraries, reading rooms, and literary associations became important spaces for the exchange of ideas and the dissemination of knowledge. These institutions played a crucial role in promoting literacy and encouraging discussions on social reform, linguistic identity, and political rights.

Parallel to the growth of libraries, newspapers and periodicals emerged as powerful instruments of communication. Newspapers such as *Golconda Patrika*, *The Rayyat*, and *Andhra Patrika* reported on social issues, criticized administrative policies, and expressed nationalist aspirations. Through editorials, articles, and public debates, these newspapers helped shape public opinion and foster political awareness among readers.

The development of print culture in Hyderabad State was closely linked with the rise of political organizations such as the Andhra Mahasabha and the Hyderabad State Congress. These organizations used newspapers and library networks to mobilize support for democratic reforms and civil liberties.

By the 1940s, political tensions in Hyderabad had intensified due to several factors, including the rise of peasant movements, the activities of the Razakar militia, and the growing influence of nationalist politics. Eventually, these developments culminated in the integration of Hyderabad into the Indian Union through Operation Polo in September 1948.

This study explores the historical dimensions of Hyderabad State with a particular focus on the role played by libraries and newspapers in shaping political consciousness and facilitating socio-political transformation.

2. Objectives of the Study

Similarly, P. Sundarayya's writings on the Telangana struggle offer detailed accounts of peasant mobilization and the ideological foundations of the movement.

Scholars such as A. R. Desai and Sumit Sarkar have examined the broader socio-economic background of political movements in India, emphasizing the relationship between class structures and nationalist politics.

Research on print culture and library movements in Hyderabad has highlighted the importance of institutions such as the Andhra Jana Sangham and Andhra Mahasabha in promoting literacy and cultural identity. Suravaram Pratap Reddy's writings and editorials in *Golconda Patrika* played a significant role in shaping Telugu cultural consciousness.

Despite these contributions, the role of libraries and newspapers in Hyderabad's political transformation has not been sufficiently explored in historical scholarship. This study attempts to bridge that gap by examining how intellectual institutions influenced political awareness and social change.

4. Methodology

This research adopts a historical-analytical methodology. The study relies on both primary and secondary sources to reconstruct the historical developments of Hyderabad State.

Primary sources include contemporary newspapers such as *Golconda Patrika*, *The Rayyat*, and *Andhra Patrika*. Archival documents, government reports, and personal memoirs of political activists also provide valuable insights into the political atmosphere of the period.

Library records, publications of literary organizations, and reports of educational institutions are examined to understand the development of intellectual culture in Hyderabad.

Secondary sources include scholarly books, journal articles, and historical analyses written by prominent historians.

The study employs qualitative analysis to examine themes related to political reform, cultural identity, agrarian relations, and media influence. Comparative analysis is used to examine differences between official narratives promoted by the Nizam's administration and alternative perspectives presented by nationalist newspapers.

Libraries as Centers of Intellectual Awakening: Libraries played a significant role in spreading education and political awareness in Hyderabad State. The establishment of reading rooms and public libraries provided access to books, newspapers, and journals, which facilitated intellectual discussions among students, teachers, and activists.

The library movement gained momentum through the efforts of organizations such as the Andhra Jana Sangham. Libraries became spaces where ideas about social reform, linguistic identity, and democratic governance were debated.

These institutions contributed to the emergence of a politically conscious middle class that played a crucial role in the nationalist movement.

Newspapers and the Growth of Public Opinion: Newspapers served as powerful instruments for shaping public opinion in Hyderabad State. Publications such as *Golconda Patrika* highlighted issues related to social reform, education, and cultural identity.

The Rayyat, founded by Mandumula Narasinga Rao, often criticized administrative policies and advocated democratic reforms.

Similarly, *Andhra Patrika* played a major role in disseminating nationalist ideas and reporting on political developments across India.

Through editorials and articles, these newspapers challenged feudal practices and promoted the ideals of equality and justice.

Libraries and Newspapers as Political Spaces: Libraries and newspapers often worked together in spreading political awareness. Newspapers were frequently read aloud in libraries and public reading rooms, allowing even illiterate individuals to access information.

This interaction between print media and public discussion created a dynamic intellectual environment that encouraged political participation.

Political Movements and Social Change: The growth of print culture contributed to the emergence of political organizations such as the Andhra Mahasabha and the Hyderabad State Congress.

These organizations used newspapers and library networks to mobilize support for civil rights and democratic reforms.

The spread of political awareness eventually contributed to mass mobilizations, including the Telangana peasant movement.
