Findings and Discussion

The expansion of educational access has not always been matched by improvements in infrastructure, teaching standards, and learning outcomes, resulting in unequal returns to education.

From a sociological perspective, these findings reflect the dual role of education as both a transformative and reproductive institution. Functionalist theories highlight education's role in skill development and merit-based mobility, whereas conflict perspectives emphasize how education can reproduce social inequalities through unequal access to quality education and cultural capital. Thus, the discussion suggests that while education in Karnataka has promoted social mobility to a significant extent, its potential remains constrained by deeper structural inequalities within society.

Conclusion

The study highlights that education has played a significant role in promoting social mobility and social change in Karnataka society. The major findings indicate that the expansion of educational opportunities, affirmative action policies, and state-led welfare initiatives have enabled many individuals from marginalized and disadvantaged communities to achieve upward mobility.
